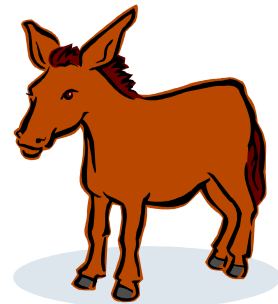


2008 Elections and Major Political Events

5 New Congress sworn in

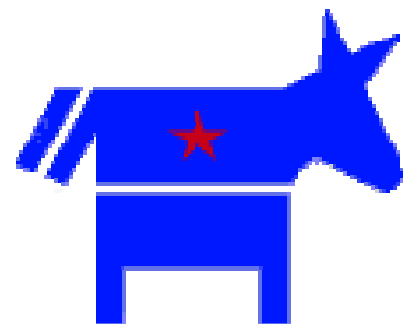
6 The votes for President and Vice President are officially tallied before both Houses of Congress

Democratic Primaries and Caucuses

Democratic candidates are campaigning for president in four phases: 1) Endorsements, 2) Early (January) primaries, which were prior to Feb. 5; 3) "Super Tuesday", took place on Feb. 5; 4) The rest of the states and territories will hold their primaries or caucuses.



Barack Obama won the nomination on June 3.

Final results: Obama (2,156), Clinton (1,923)

Total delegates needed to win nomination: 2,025 (out of 4,234)

Estimated number of delegates awarded as of June 4: 4,121 (out of 4,234)

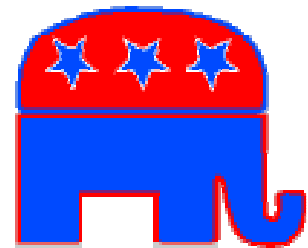

John McCain won the nomination on March 4.

Final results: McCain (1,517), Huckabee (275), Romney (255), Paul (35)

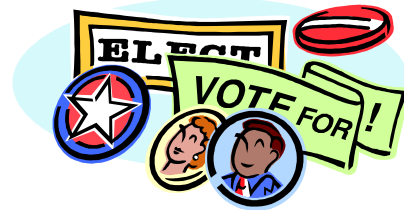
